The Effects of Deviance on Society . As we have noted, deviance is generally perceived to be disruptive in society. It can weaken established social norms, and create division and disorder. But it also has other functions which are not necessarily harmful and may actually be beneficial to society. It is one way that social change occurs. If a deviant act becomes more accepted it soon may be considered legitimate.

Symbolic interactionists interpret deviance through the following social theories: differential association theory (people learn deviance from the groups with whom they associate), control theory (people generally avoid deviance because of an effective system of inner and outer controls), and

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labeling theory (people are directed toward or away from deviance by the labels others pin on them).

Deviance and Social Control

Social control theory, developed by Travis Hirschi, is a type of functionalist theory that suggests deviance occurs when a person's or group's attachment to social bonds is weakened.

Sociology Theories of Deviance and Deviant Behavior

Deviance is any behavior that violates social norms, and is usually of sufficient severity to warrant disapproval from the majority of society. Deviance can be criminal or non-criminal. The sociological discipline that deals with crime (behavior that violates laws) is criminology (also known as criminal justice).
